


Stephenson Memorial Hall (home to the Museum and the Theatre), which has stood on Corporation Street since 1879.

Look what used to stand where the car park is now.


Then glance back and compare the view with this early photo from the 1880s


Later image of Everest's Falcon Restaurant on the corner of Low Pavement and South Street, c.1920s.

So here we are on **Packer's Row.** Look, there's John Turner Ltd.

Now, try to find where No 10 used to be. This was where Heywoods *from Manchester* once sold quality footwear.


